Showing up and standing together. Please join us for a Community Conversation on **Risk and Resilience: Weathering the Climate Crisis in Chatham County** on **Thursday, February 20, 2024 Holmes Family Meeting Room - Chatham Community Library 6:00 -8:00 pm.** The urgency of the climate crisis affects us all. Building a resilient local community is more important than ever. (See below for more details about our next Community Conversation.)

February is Black History Month and an appropriate time to recall the birth of the environmental justice movement in the US. Did you know it began in North Carolina? The environmental justice movement is widely considered to have begun in 1982 in Warren County. The movement gained national attention after a community protest against the construction of a hazardous waste landfill in this poor, predominantly Black community. Climate justice grew out of the environmental movement and connects the climate crisis to the social, racial and environmental issues in which it is deeply entangled. It recognizes the disproportionate impacts of climate change on low-income and BIPOC communities around the world, the people and places least responsible for the problem. These communities also have fewer resources for recovery and adaptation. The Justice40 initiative promises to direct benefits - specifically, at least 40% of the overall benefits from certain federal investments - towards disadvantaged communities that are disproportionately impacted by pollution and climate change.

Consistent with historical trends, North Carolina, including Chatham County, is projected to experience warming temperatures, especially at nighttime. The likelihood of extreme heat events is also projected to increase in the state, making extreme heat an important hazard for North Carolinians to be prepared for now and into the future. Chatham County developed the first Heat Action Plan in the state. The plan provides a county-level response for extreme heat events, as well as longer-term strategies for coping with heat. Emergency Management and the Public Health Department are the lead agencies.
